We are on the eve of the mighty Baltimore coin show and we have been home now for exactly three weeks. That's practically our longest stretch without a show, all year. It did give us a chance to get our house in order, but just barely. We have been buying and selling some great coins, and if the market is suffering a slowdown we do not feel it. Many collectors are still pursuing high quality and hard to find issues and that's exactly what we sell. The big news is that the central bank of India bought 6.7 billion dollars worth of gold. That may not be a lot of money to a economic powerhouse like India but it sure put another log on a fire that was already burning red hot. Gold saw 1100 today for the first time ever, closing at a meager 1094!! Word on the street is that the dollar is sinking and other countries are loaded with our treasury notes. I don't pretend to know what will happen but I can say I would be surprised if this trend were to change. Because of strong metals, U.S. Collector Gold has been red hot as well. I have never bought and sold as many U.S. gold deals as I have recently. Quite a few coins are not making our list, as they come and go quickly, so if your seeking anything yellow please let me know. If you have gold coins to sell let me know that too. We are highly competitive and pay overnight for everything. If you have generic types that are nicer than average we will pay premiums for those as well. Please call to discuss any gold deals.

The inventory list we have put together for Baltimore is quite diverse. We did buy a pretty sizable deal of high quality early large cents, which includes some tough die marriages, seldom offered in these grades. We have added several tough bust half dollars including a PCGS VF20 1795 O-120 and a VF details O-123 both R7 last time I looked. We were quite fortunate to acquire several very scarce colonials for our list while in Philadelphia, including a nice Higley Copper with strong hard surfaces and a mint condition Immunis Columbia. We have a nice run of Barber quarters this time around including some of the seldom seen dates like 96-0 and 98-0 in MS63. Throw in a pair of AU Micro O Barber half dollars, both POP 1. If you like early dollars we have a really pretty 1795 flowing hair in 58, add in a couple handfuls of gem gold and some scarce ten libs. Add a little run of Gem 66 commemoratives and the group is very well rounded, something for everyone. We encourage you to take a few minutes and look over our list, as we will be attending Baltimore next week, booth numbers 354 and 355. Its a great time to add something to your collection and we are highly motivated because so many fresh coins are being offered to us. We do a lot of trading and can figure your coins at full market value. If your coming to Baltimore remember we are strong buyers and love First Shot. If your not coming to the show we have special insurance where you can ship your deals overnight at our expense. Experience the thrill of having your coins rocket out and a check rocket in, instead of the normal cash flow shuffle.
